

Dear Alumni,

We are proud to introduce the most recent edition of Royal Legacy, the new Immaculata-La Salle magazine published specifically for our alumni. Great things are happening at Immaculata-LaSalle. The Royal Lions football team began the Coach Dillon era with a respectable 5-5 record, a slight improvement over the previous year's 4-6 record. The Royal Lions were able to make this improvement with a very young and inexperienced team, starting 10 sophomores and 2 freshmen, while playing a demanding schedule in a very tough district. And despite losing key players to injuries, the Royal Lions fought their way to a solid .500 record against some of the most formidable opponents in the state.

Despite a tough year, there were significant highlights to the season, including the outstanding play of sophomore Draquann "Doctor" Jones, who led the district in rushing with 1,100 yards total, averaging over 8 yards per carry. Dr. Jones ran for an astounding 345 yards on 22 carries in the final game of the season against Miami Country Day. For his effort, Jones was named the SE United States Player of the Week by ESPN.

Several senior leaders on the team had great campaigns this past season, including Boogie Borgella and Giancarlo Dago. Dago signed a letter of intent to play football and throw the discus at FIU. Despite suffering a serious knee injury, Borgella signed his letter of intent to play at Walsh University, on a full scholarship, in North Canton, OH. Dago and Borgella joined a growing list of La Salle graduates who are continuing their football careers at the college level. This past year,

Terrill "Bang Bang" Hanks had a huge year, starting as a freshman at New Mexico State, a Division I program. Hanks' brother, Allen Edwards, class of 2012, is playing D-I ball at Pitt. Alejandro Cardenas, class of 2014, just finished his sophomore season as the punter and place-kicker for Fordham University. And Sam Miller, class of 2010, made it all the way to the NFL, most recently on the practice squad for the Buffalo Bills.

Look for the Royal Lions to compete for the SFC Championship next season as they return some outstanding talent. In addition to Draquann Jones, look for Cam "The Man" Ryals to make a difference in the backfield. The receiving corps is stacked with Tavares "Tookie" Brownlee, Daniel Burke, Collie "Flower" Williams, and converted-quarterback Andi Rodriguez. Look for rising seniors Charles "Uncle Chuck" Mickens, and Alex Torres to lead a talented defense. The lines will be anchored by Jimmy Vargas and Rafael "Irish Cream" Crotty, and the kicking game is in the capable hands of Alexander Garcia, one of the top kickers in Dade County.

With Offensive Coordinator (and La Salle alumnus) George San Miguel and Defensive Coordinator (also La Salle alumnus) Anthony Vuono joining Head Coach Dillon on the sideline next year, the Royal Lions should be a force to be reckoned with.



Terrill Hanks, class of 2015, one of La Salle's favorite sons, graduated and seemingly went straight to the highlight film on ESPN's Plays of the Week. But it wasn't an easy journey from playing in "The Jungle" to playing in Division I of the NCAA. Last year, Terrill accepted a scholarship to play football at New Mexico State University. Of course, he had no idea what he was getting himself into. Little did he know how different things would be in New Mexico. Little did he know how much he would miss his family and friends here at La Salle. And little did he know that he would be thrust into a starting role on a struggling football team. But he has handled everything magnificently. We caught up with Terrill to chat about his experience since leaving Immaculata-La Salle.

Terrill said that things in New Mexico are naturally very different from Miami. He is still getting used to being in a desert, surrounded by mountains and people wearing cowboy hats. We asked Terrill what he misses from home. "I miss the atmosphere at La Salle. I loved coming to school every day. I miss the retreats, going to Mass with my classmates, and boy do I miss the food! Especially chicken patties and cookie Thursdays."

Terrill was voted homecoming king, but he sincerely wanted another student to win it. Both of those things speak to his high character. Everybody loved Terrill when he was here, not because he was a talented football player, but because he was a kind, gracious, and humble young man. Thankfully, that hasn't changed

one bit since he went away to college. Terrill is very close with Coach Eddie Cerdeiras and many other coaches, teachers, and students. Before every game at New Mexico, Terrill called Coach Eddie from the locker room and they prayed together on the phone. “You can do anything through Christ,” he reminded me.

New Mexico State is not exactly a powerhouse football program. They were in the Mountain West Conference, and then moved into the Sunbelt Conference. They are the “new guy on the block” in Division I football, meaning they have to get accustomed to playing superior teams. That meant that Terrill was thrust into a situation where he was playing bigger, stronger, and more talented players. In addition, his coaches did not hesitate to move him from safety to the linebacker position, where his mental and physical toughness and durability would be tested. It was a very long freshman season for Terrill, as well as his team. New Mexico State had the dubious distinction of carrying the nation’s longest losing streak, with 17 straight losses. They lost every game last year, until Oct. 31, 2015, when our own Terrill “Bang Bang” Hanks made history.

The New Mexico State Aggies were playing their conference rival, Idaho. The game was not pretty, with the Aggies down by 23 points in the third quarter. But New Mexico State mounted a ferocious comeback and tied the game, sending it to overtime. Eventually, Terrill’s team took a one-touchdown lead, but Idaho was marching down the field toward the Aggie’s end zone. The Idaho QB threw a pass over the middle, right in front of end zone. The ball was tipped up into the air, and one of Terrill’s teammates bobbled it before it dropped towards Terrill’s legs. There was no way he could have caught it with his hands, but somehow Terrill managed to catch it with his feet! He pinned the football between his ankles and maintained possession while falling to the ground. It’s an interception! Terrill’s acrobatic catch ends the game, and ends the nation’s longest losing streak. The crowd goes wild, the team rushes the field and piles up on top of Terrill in the end zone.

We asked Terrill what he was feeling after that play. “Pain!” was his response. “The first thing I will tell you is...never do a dog pile after a win.” Evidently during the celebration, with all of his teammates piled on top of him, Terrill cracked a rib. But when they finally let

him up, the moment began to sink in for Terrill. He was smiling but crying at the same time. When they showed the video on ESPN later that night, the rest of the country got to see what we already knew....that Terrill Hanks is a very special person. Not because he made a ridiculous catch, and not because he ended the nation’s longest losing streak, but because of the joyful, unselfish person that he is. The Salesian spirit from La Salle runs very deep in Terrill Hanks, like The Force in a young Jedi Knight.

Said Terrill, “I want to shout out to Coach Eddie, the football team, and the whole La Salle family!” Rest assured, Terrill, we will be shouting right back at you.

ILS New Head Football Coach

Coach Matt Dillon arrived at ILS in January 2015, replacing the retired and beloved Willie Trimmer as our Head Football Coach. Coach Dillon grew up in south Florida, having graduated from Northeast High School in Fort Lauderdale in 1977. Coach Dillon's history is an impressive one, both as player and coach. He was recognized as a small college All-American quarterback at Cornell College in Eastern Iowa, having led the entire nation in passing efficiency twice, while breaking every quarterback record in the history of the school, including throwing for over 5,000 yards and more than 50 TD's in his career. When his college career was over, Coach Dillon was selected to the Cornell College All-Century Team as the QB and a year later was inducted into the Cornell College Sports Hall of Fame.

With over 30 years of coaching experience, Coach Dillon has earned a remarkable reputation for improving football programs and cultivating the best effort he can get from his players. He took a struggling program in Bozeman, MT, with a record of 0-10, and coached them to a 6-4 record the very next year. After returning to his home state of Florida, he took a 1-9 Pope John Paul II and turned them into a 9-2 team the following year. During 6 seasons at Dowling Catholic, Coach Dillon proved he can sustain excellence with a 64-7 record, and 2 state championships. Coach Dillon received "Coach of the Year" honors a remarkable 12 times, including State of Iowa Coach of the Year, and was a finalist for Palm Beach County Coach of the Year.

Let's not forget that Coach Dillon graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Economics and Business, and a Master's degree in Athletic Administration. Immaculata-La Salle is thrilled to have Coach Dillon on board with us. Go Royal Lions!

Nate was a four year varsity starter for the Royal Lions, playing first base and pitching. As a pitcher he maintained a staggering 1.2 E.R.A. which earned him career and single season school records. Coach Nate fondly recalls the 2007 season when his E.R.A. was second best in Dade County, the Royal Lions were district champs and went all the way to the regional finals, eventually losing to blasted Gulliver.

Coach Nate went on to play Division I college ball on a pitching scholarship. Nate joined his older brother, Victor (also a La Salle alum), at Marshall University, where he graduated with a degree in Exercise Physiology. By the time he graduated, Coach Nate had placed in the top 10 in Marshall history in hits, walks, at-bats, and games played, and finished 2nd all time for doubles.



The La Salle baseball team had a solid season this past year, accumulating a 14-11 record with a super-competitive schedule. The La Salle baseball program has been hanging tough with some pretty ferocious competition, constantly playing against baseball powerhouses and 20-win teams.


This year's team experienced some huge highlights, including beating Douglas High (ranked in the top 10 in Florida) and a huge walk-off win against arch rival Belen Jesuit (for the second year in a row.) There were plenty of individual accomplishments as well. Senior Danny Rodriguez signed a letter of intent to play Divi-

sion I ball at Spring Hill College in Albany, NY. Senior catcher George Fernandez signed to play at F.I.U. Junior third baseman Santos Grande had a magnificent year, earning 2nd Team All-Dade honors and being named District 5A Hitter of the Year, boasting a .450 average. Seniors Carlos Quintana, George Fernandez and Danny Rodriguez were all selected to play in the Dade County Senior All-Star game.

First year Head Coach (and La Salle alumnus) Nate Gomez tells his players to "Win every pitch!" If they keep doing what they're doing, they might win every game!




Junior Santos Grande, flashing the leather on the hot corner, was named District 5A Hitter of the Year with a whopping .450 average.



A.P. "IRON MAN"

Alex Perez, or "A.P." as he was called at La Salle, has been making quite a name for himself in the sport of baseball. He has been called an "Iron Man" and compared to Derek Jeter. But he has also been called the "man with the golden heart." The people from La Salle who know him well are not one bit surprised.

Alex was a four-year varsity starter at La Salle, playing both shortstop and pitching. His senior year, A.P. was named the ILS “Athlete of the Year” and also garnered Miami Herald pitcher of the year, and first-team All-Dade honors. As a senior, Alex hit .440 with 2 home runs, 12 doubles, 35 runs scored, and 35 RBIs in only 29 games. On the mound, he posted an 8-1 record with a 2.33 ERA and 102 strikeouts. In short, he was unstoppable.

Alex continued his playing career at Virginia Tech which boasts a Division I program. They call him the Iron Man because he started every one of the 55 games during 2012 season. That continued all the way through the 2015 season to the point where he holds the school record for consecutive games started with 224. At one point, he was the active leader for consecutive games started in the entire NCAA. He also holds school records for most triples in a game, most assists in a game by a second baseman, most assists in a season by a second baseman, and most assists in a career. At the plate, A.P. had 15 game-winning RBIs and 20 game-winning runs scored. He also had two huge

walk-off RBIs, including one against the 6th best team in the nation at the time, his hometown University of Miami on April 14, 2012. Doesn't get much sweeter than that.

Well, maybe it does. A.P. made Sportcenter's “Top 10 Plays of the Week” with a “Jeter-esque” jump throw from deep in the hole at shortstop.

At the conclusion of his college career, A.P. was drafted in the 23rd round of the MLB Draft by the Minnesota Twins. Since then he has been steadily climbing the ranks of the minor leagues for the Twins organization. As of June, 2016, he was with the Fort Myers Miracle, hitting an astonishing .313. A.P. doesn't just get by on talent. He is one of the hardest working guys you will come across. He is listed at 5'10 and 180 lbs. Logan Bible, A.P.'s roommate at Virginia Tech, commented, “He may be a little guy, but he can throw up some pretty big weight in the weight room.” With regard to Alex' work ethic, Logan continued, ““He comes in after practice each and every day when guys are going back to their apartments and he gets his extra hacks in. He always worked harder than everyone else....you can see he had an extra gear.”

A.P. said on his twitter account, “Ambition is priceless. It's something that's in your veins and I pray that never changes for me.” With all of the praise A.P. receives for his on-field talent and work ethic, the highest

praise is reserved for his character. It was due to his high character, not his high batting average, that his college coach, Pat Mason, made him the team captain. Said Mason, “He’s the most respectful person you could ever be around. He is the first one to pick up a teammate if they make an error or if things aren’t going good. He’s the first one to pat someone on the back or congratulate you when you have a baby. He’s awesome. The way he talks to and treats kids who come to the ballpark, or alumni, or recruits...he just treats everyone with the same respect and kindness. He’s


one of the best guys I’ve ever met in my life.” As seems to be the case frequently, the conversations about A.P. the ballplayer turn into conversations about A.P. the person.

Legacy is proud to spotlight the three Baldassini sisters, all of whom have graduated Immaculata-La Salle, and all of whom are attending college on full scholarships thanks to their soccer skills. All three young ladies are excellent students, leaders in their respective classes, and clearly, hard-working soccer players.

The Baldassini family is originally from Argentina, where all three sisters earned a spot on the Argentinian national team. All three sisters were 4-year starters on the varsity squad during high school, all three were captains of their respective La Salle teams, all three competed on the La Salle track team, and all three received a multitude of awards and accolades, both academic and athletic.

Sol is the oldest sister and is currently a junior at Georgia College, playing defensive mid-fielder for the Bobcats. While at ILS, Sol lead her team to two district titles, was named captain for her senior year, set a school record for the 4X8 relay on the track team, won 2nd Team All-Dade honors, and won the scholastic award for Anatomy Honors class. Sol is majoring in Accounting, and is planning to continue her soccer career by playing professionally in Europe.

Nicole is the middle child of the Baldassini family, and is currently a freshman at New Jersey Institute of Technology, a Division I soccer program in Jersey City, NJ, on a full scholarship. While at ILS, Nicole earned 1st Team All Dade honors twice, was captain and MVP of the soccer team her senior year, and was awarded Stu-

dent Athlete of the Year, with the highest GPA (4.89) of all student-athletes at La Salle. Nicole is majoring in Bio Medical Engineering and is planning to go on to medical school to become a doctor.

Flor is the third daughter in the family, and was a ferocious defensive midfielder for the Lady Lions. She just began her freshman year at Stetson University in Deland, FL, where she earned a full scholarship. Flor was a four year varsity starter, was awarded the Coach's Award for her junior year, was captain for her junior and senior year, and was awarded MVP honors her freshman and her senior years.

When asked about their favorite soccer memories from La Salle, all three Baldassini sisters responded with the same memory. There was one season (2012-2013 school year) when all three sisters were playing on the La Salle varsity squad together at the same time. It's no wonder the team went undefeated that year! Sol recalls scoring a come-from-behind goal, shot from almost the mid-field to tie the game against Doral Academy, preserving the undefeated season. Nicole recalls beating Archbishop McCarthy for the first time in school history that year. Just so happens, Nicole scored the go-ahead goal in that game. In addition, when recalling their high school soccer careers, all three sisters were quick to thank Coach Gammy, Coach Vuono, Coach Vengoechea, and especially Coaches Eddie and Aimee Cerdeiras.

The 2015-16 ILS girls' soccer team had a solid season, finishing 10-7-1. The team was led by second year Head Coach Gamy Lozano and Assistant Coach Anthony Vuono. Both coaches are La Salle graduates, and ironically, both played on the La Salle boys' team in the late 90's that won the first ever district title for the boys' squad.

Although the Lady Lions fell short of their goal of a district title, the season was not without its highlights. Junior superstar Karina Santin had a season for the ages, setting a school record with 39 goals, and being

named 1st Team All-Dade. Senior captain Flor Baldassini was also named 1st Team All-Dade, and earned a full scholarship to play Division I soccer at Stetson University. Freshman Stephanie Cuan earned 2nd Team All-Dade and junior Nikki Marabona 3rd team All-Dade.

The Lady Lions had some great moments this season, including huge wins against division rivals Mater Lakes, MAST Academy, and archrival St. Brendan's. There is plenty to build on for next year and we look forward to a great season.









The Vision Statement of Immaculata-La Salle High School includes the commitment to the “holistic formation of young people into good, faithful Christians and productive, responsible citizens.” The Salesians at La Salle enthusiastically search for ways to educate their students in the area of responsible citizenship. The club produces a frightening and fun haunted house, and in doing so, raises money for the Lotus House, which is an organization dedicated to assisting homeless women and children right here in Miami. Quite a good cause, organized by La Salle alumnus Bella del Oca, a veteran of La Salle theatre who currently volunteers her time for the Lotus House. Don Bosco would be very proud of the folks in the drama department at ILS.

IMMACULATA-LA SALLE


In response to both the global and local demand for skilled healthcare workers, La Salle just completed year 1 of their comprehensive Health Sciences Concentration program with magnificent results. Students interested in the medical or healthcare fields enrolled in classes ranging from First Aid and CPR to such advanced courses such as Anatomy and Physiology.

In addition to learning in the traditional classroom environment, all students completed mandatory rotations at Mercy Hospital in a variety of roles in different departments. Freshmen began with assisting in different administrative roles such as medical records and risk management. Sophomores got their hands dirty in wound care, and occupational and physical therapy. Juniors learned more advanced skills including radiology and pathology, while seniors gained valuable experience working in the emergency room, the maternity ward and even the behavioral health department.

Clearly, these are not candy striper duties the students are charged to fulfill.

As always, the administration at ILS remembers the greater goal of the Catholic system, including charitable work for the needy or less fortunate. As such, program requirements included accumulating 40 hours of volunteer time at Mercy Hospital, all of which was in addition to their mandatory rotations at the hospital.

Much credit goes to Kimberly Shaw, Science Department Chairperson, as well as Dr. De Leon, head of the Mercy Hospital OBGYN Department (and proud La Salle father) for instituting the partnership with Mercy Hospital. Great to see our students benefitting from the most in-demand curriculum and real-world experience, while at the same time learning the value of volunteering at a wonderful Catholic hospital.



She recalls driving an old green Kingwood station wagon and filling it up with a handful of La Salle kids along the way. Four of her five sisters (Ruth, Ernestine, Annie, and Mary Frances) also attended La Salle. Despite the daily 50 mile, round-trip drive, they all think very fondly of their days at La Salle.

Grace's father was a Colonel in the U.S. Air Force, and raised his children in quite a structured environment. Legacy is honored to spotlight Mr. Pedro Martin, Chairman and CEO of Terra Group, which is located just a couple miles down Bayshore Drive. One thing is for sure: Mr. Martin knows Miami real estate. It's no wonder that his offices are just down the street from his alma mater, Immaculata-La Salle High School.

Mr. Martin appreciates the value of education very much. After graduating from La Salle, he went on to earn an engineering degree from the University of Florida in 1971. Then he went on to earn his MBA from Rollins College in 1976. While at Rollins, Mr. Martin had a professor who was also an attorney. This professor must have had some influence on young Pedro, because after earning his MBA, he went on to law school at the University of Florida, where he graduated with a law degree in 1978. For those of you keeping count, that's three degrees (Engineering, MBA, and Law) in eleven years!

Mr. Martin practiced real estate law as a partner at Greenberg Traurig for 25 years, representing developers and financial institutions. Eventually, Pedro wanted to get back into the business side of real estate and founded the Terra Group in 2001. Soon after, he began developing commercial and residential buildings all over Miami, including Coconut Grove, Miami Beach, Doral, and Sunny Isles. We are very proud to point out that Mr. Martin is quite the philanthropist in our community. He contributes

Rodney Barreto Class of 1976 Miami's Finest Ambassador

Legacy is honored to spotlight Rodney Barreto, Immaculata-La Salle's class of 1976. Mr. Barreto is quite the busy man, having served in countless capacities in business, politics, philanthropic projects, and outreach work in the Miami community. Perhaps he is best known as the man to bring the Super Bowl back to Miami. If nothing else, that accomplishment surely makes him a hero in quite a few circles.

Mr. Barreto refers to himself as a "serial entrepreneur," meaning he has had his hand in countless business endeavors. He is currently President and CEO of The Barreto Group, a diversified consulting company specializing public affairs, real estate, and healthcare data management. Mr. Barreto is also the founder of Floridian Partners, LLC, a consulting firm recognized by policy makers as one of the top public affairs firms in the state of Florida. Rodney was also a founding partner in Healthcare Data Solutions, a full service electronic medical records company which has earned high praise in its field. Coming from humble beginnings as a Miami city police officer, Mr. Barreto has certainly come a long way in the business world.

As successful as his business career has been, Rodney's efforts in the public sector may even be more impressive. He served ten years on the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, having been personally appointed by Governor Jeb Bush and re-appointed to a second term by Governor Charlie Crist, a testament to his reputation as a public servant. Being held in such high regard led to Mr. Barreto serving in many other capacities as well. He has twice chaired the Annual U.S. Conference of Mayors here in Miami. He was Chairman of the 1999 Breeder's Cup Championship, Chairman of the 1999 Sister Cities International Convention, and Co-Chairman of the City of Miami Centennial Celebration in 1996. Rodney was also instrumental in bringing the Ultra Music Festival

to Miami, and he created the Big Orange New Year's Eve Celebration, a tradition that continues to this day.

Perhaps most notably, Rodney has been Chairman of the South Florida Super Bowl Host Committee an astounding three times, an accomplishment that no one else in the country can claim. During his tenure, he has raised in excess of \$40,000,000 to bring the Super Bowl back to Miami, ensuring that Miami shines in the spotlight as an international destination for business and tourism.

Mr. Barreto has always found time to volunteer and give back to his community. Among other projects, he has served on the boards of The Baptist Hospital Foundation, Goodwill Industries of South Florida, The Bonefish and Tarpon Trust, and The Guy Harvey Ocean Foundation. He has received dozens of awards and accolades for his continuing contributions to the city of Miami, including being presented the Key to the County by Mayor Stephen Clark and being presented the Key to the City of Miami by Mayor Manny Diaz.

Long before being presented with the keys to the city, Rodney was the Captain of the ILS football team. Always able to make time for his Alma Mater, he was kind enough to offer some words of wisdom for our students. "Pursue your passion, and never take 'no' for an answer. Work hard, and trust the people that support you, and good things will come." Always the realist, he added, "Prepare for rejection. Pick yourself up, dust yourself off, and try again. Nothing comes on a silver platter."

Being the only man to ever chair 3 different Super Bowl Committee's, he should know. Congratulations to Mr. Barreto, Miami's finest ambassador, and proud Immaculata-La Salle alum.

Before he became a world famous trial lawyer, Ervin Gonzalez was the captain of the La Salle baseball team. He was a four-year starter on the varsity squad, playing shortstop (the most difficult position to play) and the hot corner (third base). But Ervin was no one-dimensional jock; he was a member of student government, the math club, and the National Honor Society.

After graduating from La Salle, young Ervin went on to St. Thomas University's Biscayne College, where he graduated *summa cum laude* (for those who don't speak Latin, this is an academic distinction meaning "with highest honors"). In other words, Ervin was a magnificent student. He then went on to study law at the University of Miami, graduating, of course, *cum laude*.

He is a partner at Colson Hicks Eidson in Coral Gables, Florida. Ervin is a former Governor of The Florida Bar, Past President of the Dade County Bar Association, Past President of the Dade County Trial Lawyers

Association and a former Director of the Academy of Florida Trial Lawyers. He has been appointed by a Federal Judge several times to serve on the Steering Committee for major lawsuits including the BP Oil Spill Litigation.



He was recently named one of the "Top 500 Litigators in the Nation" by Law Dragon. Ervin has also been rated as one of the 100 Most Influential Hispanics in the Nation by Hispanic Business Magazine. We really don't have enough space to print all of Mr. Gonzalez' accomplishments, honors, and awards, but suffice it to say if you need a good lawyer, you should really call him.

We asked Ervin about his time here at La Salle, and he was kind enough to share some memories. Of course he remembers the tradition of hanging toilet paper all over the campus for the senior prank. Sister Red Worley threatened to have the seniors arrested if they went through with it. It's really a good thing Sister Red did not follow through with her threat, because it's hard to be a trial lawyer with a criminal record. Ervin also fondly recalls Coach Grosso who had a big influence on his life, teaching him "how to win, how to lose, how to respect others, and how to respect myself." Ervin also recalls Mr. and Mrs. Maderos, Mr. Hackett, his biology teacher, and of course Van Parsons, the baseball coach, football coach, and Athletic Director. When asked about any advice he may have for current La Salle students, he suggested they enjoy their time at La Salle to the fullest. He mentioned that during high school, you're young enough to enjoy life but old enough to develop yourself academically while building a foundation for life's challenges.

Mr. Gonzalez believes that Immaculata-La Salle is a great place to build that foundation. "To this day," he said, "I still bleed green and gold." We do too, Ervin, and we are proud to call you our alumnus.

Jason Quiroga always knew he wanted to be an engineer for NASA. In fact, he told his teacher as much on the first day of his freshman year at ILS. Fast forward about 6 years, and he is indeed well on his way. After 2 years in the Miami-Dade Honors Program, Jason is transferring to the University of Central Florida in Orlando due to its affiliation with NASA. Jason has already worked closely with engineers from NASA, who happen to be professors at U.C.F. Last year, Jason completed a rigorous NASA program called the NASA Aerospace Scholars project at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Alabama. He worked closely with engineers on a project called mission RESOLVE, an exploratory project to drill for water on the moon. Upon his completion of the program, Jason addressed the Miami Dade College Board of Trustees and the Miami Dade College Foundation Board of Directors detailing his experiences at NASA.

Jason was invited back to NASA in the spring to see the progress of their work. He shadowed NASA RESOLVE mission engineers and also met with the Project Lead Engineers from several departments in order to secure his next internship with NASA. 





Robotics Team Highlights La Salle's STEAM Initiative

The robotics team at La Salle, better known as Bosco's Bots, has been an award-winning robotics team for several years now, having competed at a variety of tournaments all over South Florida. This year, Bosco's Bots finished in first place at the South Florida FTC Qualifying Tournament at St. Thomas Aquinas High School, and earned second team finalist honors at several other tournaments.

Of course at La Salle, it's never just about competing. There is, and always will be, the higher goal of developing charitable young men and women, who seek to share their talents and skills with the community. True to form, Bosco's Bots traveled to St. Michael the Archangel, a Catholic K-8 feeder school for Immaculata-La Salle here in Miami. Several members of the La Salle robotics team, along with Scott Givonetti, the moderator of Bosco's Bots, brought a variety of robots to St. Michael's for the day, where the entire student body was treated to demonstrations of small robots, big robots, and even a brand new drone, all created in La Salle's STEAM lab.

Fernando Casamayor

Fernando Casamayor possesses a Bachelor's of Professional Studies Degree from Barry University and joined the City of Miami's administrative team in April, 2014. As Assistant City Manager and Chief Financial Officer, he is responsible for the oversight of Finance, Grants Administration, Information Technology, the Office of Management and Budget, Procurement, Risk Management and Strategic Planning. He is also the City liaison with the Firefighters' and Police Retirement Trust, the General Employees' and Sanitation Employees' Retirement Trust and the Liberty City Trust. Mike Parra



Andres Pumariega

Dr. Pumariega has devoted his over 35 year career in psychiatry and child/adolescent psychiatry to children’s systems of care and cultural diversity in mental health. He is currently Professor and Chair, Department of Psychiatry, Cooper Health



System and Cooper School of Medicine of Rowan University. After graduating from ILS in 1971, he received his BS from the University of Miami in 1973, M.D. from the University of Miami School of Medicine in 1976 (and later inducted into its Alumni Hall of Fame in 1999) and residency and fellowship in general and child psychiatry at Duke University Medical Center (1980). He previously headed two pediatric psychiatry consultation-liaison services (Vanderbilt University Medical Center and Baylor College of Medicine-Texas Children’s Hospital); three directorships of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry (University of Texas Medical Branch, University of South Carolina, and East Tennessee State University), and chaired two departments of psychiatry (East Tennessee State University and Reading Hospital and Medical Center, also Professor of Psychiatry at Temple University). He is a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association (APA), Distinguished Fellow of the Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP), Fellow of the American College of Psychiatrists, and Life Fellow of the American Orthopsychiatric Association. He has served as Associate Editor of the American Journal of Orthopsychiatry and the Journal of Child and Family Studies, and on the Editorial Board of Community Mental Health Journal, Journal of Child and Family Studies, and Adolescent Psychiatry. He helped draft the CMHS Cultural Competence Standards (1999), the only national cultural competence standards for behavioral health, and is lead author of the AACAP Practice Parameter for Culturally Competent Care (2013),

the only cultural practice parameter in Medicine. He served as President of the American Orthopsychiatric Association (2010-2012) and President of the American Association of Social Psychiatry (2013-2015), now Immediate Past President. He was the founding Chair, Work Group on Systems of Care (1994-2001), Co-Chair of the Committee on Diversity and Culture (2007-2015) in the AACAP; and Chair, Committee on Hispanic Psychiatrists (2006-2009) of the APA. He has over 180 scientific publications, over published 250 abstracts, two edited textbooks, four edited journal special issues, and multiple research and service demonstration grants. Andres has received numerous awards, including the APA's Simon Bolivar Award and Lecture in Hispanic Psychiatry (2004), and the AACAP's Jeanne Spurlock Award and Lecture on Diversity and Culture (2007). He was appointed by Secretary Shalala to the Advisory Committee of the Center for Mental Health Services, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (1998-2001), and by the Obama Administration to serve on the Advisory Committee on Family Residential Centers for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (2016-2019). Andres has been happily married to JoAnne Buttacavoli Pumariega, M.A. (ILS Alumni Hall of Fame 2015) for over 40 years, and their daughters are Christina Pumariega M.A., working actress in New York City with multiple performances to her credit, and Nicole Pumariega, M.D., MSBME, resident physician in Cooper Health entering Ophthalmology residency at Drexel University in July 2016. They enjoy travel, cross-cultural discovery, and spending time with their daughters, including attending Christina's performances.

Nancy Foye-Cox

Nancy Rose Foye-Cox is the eldest of four daughters born to the late Edward Daniel Foye, Jr. and Rose Jeannette Ryan Foye, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on August 19, 1946. Nancy graduated from St. Michael the Archangel School before graduating from Immaculata Academy in 1964. She was In National Honor Society, 4-H and Glee Club, and first-page co-editor of the Corona school newspaper.



A 1968 Florida State University alumna, she retired in 2013 with 40+ years in government with counties in Florida and Ohio, the State of New Mexico, and the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development. She recruited women as city and county managers at the International City & County Management Association (ICMA) (1977-1979); and was an Equal Opportunity Officer and Diversity Trainer at FIU (1995-1999) and an American Association of University Women (AAUW) National Diversity Resource Team member (1997).

After teaching at Immaculata-LaSalle (1970-1972), her first government job was with Dade County Housing & Urban Development, and her last was Victim Advocate with the Summit County, Ohio Prosecutor's Office. With Dade County (1972-1977 and 1982-1989). Nancy was recognized by the National Association of County Information Officers for managing communications and the airport media center during Saint Pope John Paul II and President Ronald Reagan's Miami Visit (1987); she planned the official Dade County Sesquicentennial celebration (1986) and the opening of the new Miami-Dade Main Library and Cultural Center (1984). She was named a Trailblazer by the Metro-Dade County Women Employees Association (1989).

An American Society for Public Administration (ASPA) National Council member (2012-2015), she was on the PA TIMES editorial board and helped plan the 50th ASPA Annual Conference in Miami (1988). As National Committee for Women in Public Administration Co-chair (1980-1981), she published a commemorative newsletter edition and organized a luncheon to honor ASPA's 'Decade of Women' (1971-1981). A Section for Women in Public Administration charter and Board member, in 2014 Foye-Cox received the Dedicated Service to SWPA Award and convened an ASPA Women Founders Panel for the 75th ASPA Annual Conference. She has written book chapters, and continues to write articles, about the history of women in the profession.

Most noteworthy is her leadership as a national co-founder of National Women's History Week. Nancy was one of 45 women representing 37 national women's organizations participating in the Summer Institute in Women's History for Leaders of National Women's Organizations at Sarah Lawrence College with support from the Women's Action Alliance and the Smithsonian Institution (1979). The historic outcome called for the implementation of National

Women's History Week to focus on the role of women in American history. Nancy and Dr. Bettye Collier-Thomas co-founded the first National Women's History Week in the District of Columbia (1980) and also founded the first Florida celebration in Dade County (1982). National Women's History Month became a reality in 1987.

Retirement has not slowed her down. In 2015, she joined the Board of the National Women's History Project (NWHP), which recognizes and celebrates the diverse and historic accomplishments of women by providing informational services and educational and promotional materials. Previously, she chaired the Broward County, Florida Women's Hall of Fame Selection Committee (1997-2000). Now a Juvenile Court motivational speaker, Foye-Cox is on the Episcopal Diocese of Ohio Council Executive Committee and co-chairs their Commission for Racial Understanding. A Friend of Historic St. John's Episcopal Church-Ohio City, she led the effort for the Ohio Underground Railroad marker installed there (2015).

Nancy's life, career and community outreach has made a positive impact. Whether being a great student and ILHS educator, advocating for individuals and causes, uplifting women and their role in society or shaping this country's history in a positive way, she remains dedicated and devoted to her faith in God and humanity. Nancy's spouse, Raymond W. Cox III, is a Professor of Public Administration at the University of Akron. They have lived in Akron, Ohio since 2000 and will celebrate their 27th wedding anniversary on May 19th. Son, Geoffrey, and daughter-in-law, Devyani, reside in Alexandria, Virginia.

Carmen Hoyos

As a little girl, Carmen played "school" with her older sister. Back then, her sister was the teacher, of course. And Carmen, eager to enjoy her weekends or her summer, easily fell into the role of the "bad" student – escaping the confines of the Florida room that made up their "one-room Miami school-house." Her sister would drag her back and make her write lines on the chalkboard. So Carmen did not go on to study Education, but rather Psychology. Once



graduated, she wondered about a possible job and one came – where she least expected: Corpus Christi Elementary School. She became an elementary school teacher, thinking it was just temporary until she found her "real" job. Then, she fell in love with all those little inner city kids who needed so much more than a teacher – they needed someone who could recognize all that stood between them and their education and that affected them the way it did. Carmen remembers the kids more than her lessons and how she tried to raise them above the poverty, the language barriers, and the alcoholism that was for many their home environment. She felt a calling to return day after day for the sake of those children; to be sure they were safe. She kept returning for more than 7 years. She then realized that all those years of working in education and her interest in psychology had a point of commonality: counseling. She found her job and her authentic self. She entered St. Thomas University and earned a Master's Degree in guidance counseling.

This year marks her 20th year at Immaculata-La Salle High School. Her influence can be felt in the marine science program that began with her desire to teach an elective that spoke to one of her passions. It can be felt in the many international and domestic missions whose footholds are the steps she took to create the incredibly successful Mindo orphanage mission to Ecuador, which ran for over 10 years and still runs today with alumni. These experiences formed her vision when she took on the role of activities director, in which she coordinates and guides students and teachers to create meaningful experiences from their own passions and sense of compassion. As counselor, Carmen has guided and helped the Sophomore classes. It seems a proper fit that she should have the class that traditionally experiences the most growing pains, the one that goes through a time where most become "bad" students for a while. It was also a perfect fit that, for a long time, she was the counselor for the transfer students who needed someone to steer them through a new home safely.

For more than anything, what Carmen has offered ILS is the dedicated concern for people who are in need that propelled her to study psychology in the first place. Her love of people – especially children – and her empathy and care for the difficulty that living sometimes is are what make her the laudable educator we honor today.



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
